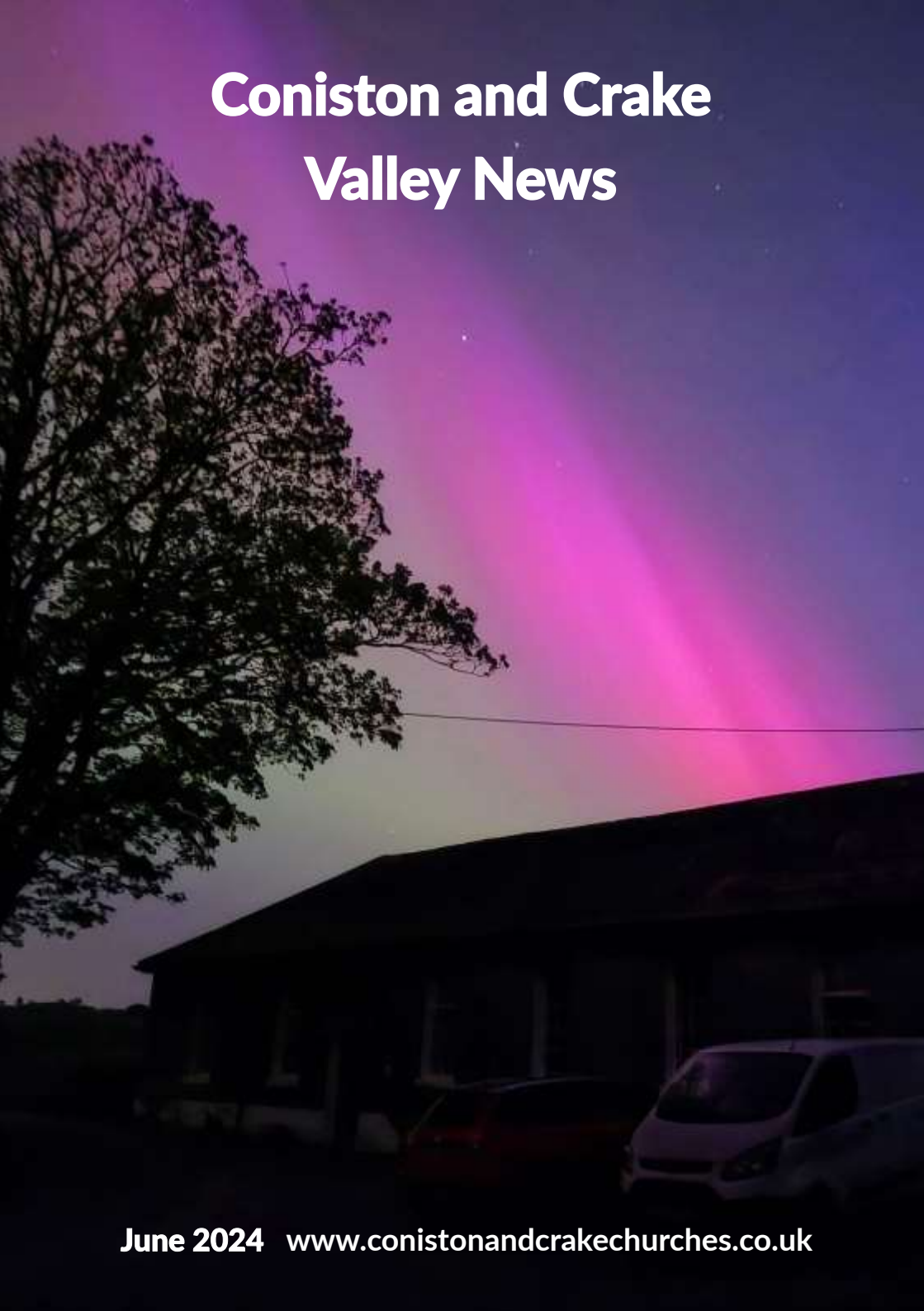

Pastoral Letter

LIFE-BREATHING

Recently, I visited Gothenburg in Sweden for a Christian conference, and at the conference I prayed for many Swedish people who came forward with prayer needs. It was both a very rewarding and very exhausting time.

Now the common thinking is that Sweden is a progressive, modern, clean, highly-organised, and prosperous country – and this has clearly been the case in my experiences of Sweden. This appears to be a thriving, forward-looking country with a good mix of modern city life and an appreciation of the natural world. All good one would think then? Well, no.

The prayer needs of the Christians in Sweden, from my experience, certainly reflected the same needs as in the UK and other nations – their families and personal relationships. But for those without a faith, in Sweden there is also a palpable feeling – especially amongst the young – that something is missing, that there is more to life than can be found on TikTok, in dining out, climbing the corporate ladder, launching a new start-up, or retiring to the summer house by the lake. Something was missing and the hunger was palpable.

And in the UK we have similar misgivings about modern life and that there must be more to life than we immediately see. This anxiety is further increased by the tensions in the world and the disappointments of our own nation – a pointless war in Ukraine; Iran, China and North Korea becoming increasingly aggressive; an unstoppable wave of immigrants, legal and illegal; politics that leads to just apathy and anger. Surely, there is something more and better than this?

In the Book of Ezekiel, the prophet Ezekiel is taken in a prophetic dream to a desert valley full of dry human bones. The LORD God then told Ezekiel to prophesy to the bones, which Ezekiel did, and the bones came together, sinews, flesh, and skin. And then the Lord God commanded Ezekiel,

'Prophecy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live.' I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

What is missing in our lives is the breath of God, the Holy Spirit, God who would live in us as a soulmate. Without God in us, we will feel like dry bones, lifeless and simply lying in the sun. That is what is missing, and it is this that will bring hope and direction to life – just ask the Swedes that I prayed for!

The Council heard that its applications for 20mph speed limits in Greenodd/Penny Bridge and in Spark Bridge have not been included in the first batch of schemes to be implemented by W&FC. We will continue to press for these schemes to be realised as soon funds allow.

As reported in the May edition of this magazine the Council's Heritage Project is making very good progress with a team of a dozen or so researchers. In all Councillor Barbara Hind has succeeded in engaging about 50 people in working on the various aspects of the Project.

Work on revising the Parish Plan will proceed during the year ahead with the objective of publishing a new plan in 2025.

The Council has decided to hold some of its meetings in the Mill Room, Broughton Beck and in Spark Bridge Village Hall.

A THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH by Rev. David Gregg
JUNE 6TH : D-DAY (80th Anniversary)

This poem appeared in our Gosport Grammar School magazine in the late 1940's.

Last Sunday we went sailing and we saw a submarine,
It surfaced just ahead of us and didn't look too clean.
It was battered and bedraggled, and it looked a proper crate,
And the barnacles and seaweed must have added to its weight.
The conning tower opened and we heard her captain roar,
"Surrender, British dogs, for you are prisoners of war!"
Our skipper told the Jerry, "The War is over, son."
"It's over?" said the German, "Vell, for pity's sake, who won?"
Our patriotic skipper said, "The British did, my lad!"
At first their captain looked surprised, and then he looked quite
sad.
He leaned down in the conning tower, and shouted with a frown,
"Send Wilhelm to the mess, und take the Kaiser's portrait down!"

In 1947 my family moved to Lee-on-the-Solent, where the reminders of World War 2, and particularly D-Day, were everywhere around. (We were told that our eight-bedroomed hotel had had 200 troops billeted there on the days before D-Day.) During the War we had lived on the outskirts of Birmingham. The first *dateable* memory of my life was 14th November 1940, when I was just short of three years old, and witnessed the horrific blitz on Coventry, just 20 miles away. To people of my generation "The War" is still the pivotal point of our lives. Even today, if you look at any magazine or TV programmes, you will find films or documentaries or discussions about World War 2 advertised on practically every page! The significance of D-Day is that it marked the definitive *Victory* of the War. It took nearly another year to complete the rout of the Nazis (with a number of notable counter-attacks and setbacks like Arnhem, the Battle of the Bulge, the flying bombs etc.) but eventually the enemy surrendered, and Peace in Europe was achieved.

For Christians, the "War" between Good and Evil is the overarching theme of the Bible from cover to cover – the Garden of Eden in Genesis to the Garden of Paradise in Revelation. The decisive event is the Victory of Jesus Christ over Satan on the Cross of Calvary, confirmed by His Resurrection. His cry, "It is finished!" signifies the personal perception of Jesus Himself of the moment of Victory. Ultimate peace will come at His return, and meanwhile we are living in the 'mopping up' period. Satan is defeated but still active and we are called to complete the Victory with our faith and witness and steadfastness, and the proof of 'good works', as evidence of the reality of which 'side' we are on.

5th: Pray for the Benefice Staff team meeting this afternoon.

6th: Pray for the 80th Anniversary of D-Day Landings in Normandy as the Nation honours the bravery and sacrifice of those who participated in the operation that impacted the course of the Second World War.

7th: Pray for Midwives working in hospital and home settings.

8th: On World Oceans Day pray for wisdom to reverse the effects on oceans and waterways of overfishing, chemical pollution, ocean mining and plastic waste.

Wildflower Plug Planting at Boon Crag this August and September

We need your help to restore the wildflower hay meadows at Boon Crag this summer!

Since the 1930's, we have lost 97% of our wildflower meadows in Britain and now it only covers 1% of the land. Species rich grasslands, like hay meadows, are important for many reasons. To name a few of their ecosystem services; these habitats help increase pollination, improve soil health, act as natural flood defenses, improve animal health and provide nutritious food.

Cumbria Wildlife Trust and the National Trust are working together to restore traditional hay meadows to three of the fields at Coniston and the more helping hands we can get, the better.
